Hello Brothers and Sisters,

We are here and we are there. Each of us, isolated in our own places and attempting to maintain social distancing and our health. Being caught up in this pandemic has proven stressful. It has led to some experiencing greater symptoms of depression and loneliness. It has led to intense financial difficulties for many. Our national economy may not be able to recover.

Yet, God has still got this. He is still seated on the throne. He is not up pacing wondering how his creation is going to make it through this. He is not going without sleep because of worry or anxiety. He has got this.

And so does His Church.

We have not given up. We have found new ways to maintain contact. We have attended church services over the internet. We have shared holy communion. We have continued to pray. We have, in some ways taken over Facebook—Sunday mornings inundating the news feeds with live services in which the word of God is shared. We have continued to pray. In some cases, we have even learned to pray more.

This is only a brief word of encouragement. I thought about trying to figure out how to show the numbers. Do you realize that, though only one or two people may come in to the service through Facebook, the resulting numbers of viewers is 40+. That is not including the regular members coming together through the Zoom meeting. That is 40 souls whom COS has touched that, if it was not for this virus forcing us to think outside the building, we might never have reached. This is impressive if you ask me.

And, given the benefit to His creation, we have to consider the potential of continuing in this way even once everything is returned to “normal.”

Those who survive trauma know that “normal” gets redefined after the trauma passes. It will never be what it was prior to the event. Those who perhaps have relatives that shared stories following the Great Depression or those who have served in the military or experienced great personal loss know exactly what I mean. Make no mistake, what we are experiencing now is going to leave a mark. Our normal will no longer be what it was just 5 years ago. It never can be. We don't have a handy dandy DeLorean to use to go back in time. All we have is what comes next.

So, I will close with a period of trauma that comes out of the bible. Right now we are celebrating Easter. It is the time in which we remember most intently the journey of Jesus to the cross, his death and then his resurrection. Prior to the resurrection, what was normal now like for the disciples? It was loaded with fear. The disciples were hidden behind locked doors. Even after Jesus confirmed his resurrection to his disciples many still went back to their old lives for a time (or at the least tried to). This was their new normal.

And then they were obedient.

Following the resurrection and teachings Jesus gave them, he left them with one last instruction. Don't do anything until the power comes from on high. That is, until the coming of the Holy Spirit. What did it take for that next normal? They had to get together. They had to pray together, and they had to agree in that prayer in the deepest sense of agreement. Then, 50 days after the resurrection, the power from on high was released and the Church was born.

Our new normal is something similar. We cannot nor should we go back to what life was like before. We should press on. We should pray on. We should believe on. And we should look for the next move that God calls us to.
