Anglican Frontier Mission: \$300

A letter written by Father Frank Lockwood to the Albany Diocese

To: The Standing Committee of the Diocese of Albany

From: Rev. Frank Lockwood

Dear Members of the Standing Committee:

First, please allow me to introduce myself to those who are unfamiliar with me. I am Reverend Frank Lockwood. I am priest in charge of both Christ Church in Coxsackie and Church of Our Saviour in New Lebanon. I have been a member of the Diocese of Albany nearly all my adult life. I was raised up out of Zion Episcopal Church in Hudson Falls towards the diaconate and later ordained priest while serving as the Deacon Vicar of Christ Church in Coxsackie.

I have watched as several factors have, I feel it fair to say, ravaged our diocese. I have watched the exit of our former bishop and the pain, anger, and several other emotions that this has caused. I have seen the national church go through their changes and the effect that this has had not only on our diocese but on the Anglican Communion and our relationships through it.

Recently I participated in our electronic version of our annual convention. I saw the proposals that came through including the request to match the canons of the national church. I was relieved that we duly voted against changes to canon or constitution while in an electronic format. I did plainly hear that some were nervous about speaking in a face-to-face meeting and that they would have been more comfortable debating the issues in the electronic format. I certainly can identify with that type of anxiety.

To that is what I would ask you to consider: the setting up of a moderated round table discussion, perhaps to be recorded, that would be limited in attendees to begin a dialogue. The statement made during convention is that our Diocese needs to heal. I absolutely agree with that. However, I do not believe that there is only one side of "the issue" that needs the healing. I believe that the various sides of the various issues that we as a church face in this post church world has led to deep wounds for many. Healing is needed.

To initiate that process of healing, I would suggest that it would begin by first establishing a framework in which others would actually hear each other's viewpoints and perspectives. That we would seek to find the common ground for us all to stand upon as we look towards the future of our spiritual journey together. Scripture directs us to this end. I would point towards the council of Jerusalem and the "issue" about admitting non-Jews into the faith. Clearly the apostles modeled a time of listening, prayer and seeking true guidance from the Holy Spirit. If they had not, we all would be far more fluent in Hebrew and many homes would no longer be having their shellfish on Christmas eve.

I am not suggesting that this be done with the intent of changing canon or constitution. The intent of this type of gathering/round table discussion would be to allow for expression, listening, hearing (yes there is a difference between listening to someone and truly hearing them), reflection, prayer and coming back for another discussion.

There is no "good time" for such a thing to take place. There never will be. So, now is as good a time to consider this as any.

Thank you for "listening". May God have mercy on all of His children.
