We had reports from Christ the King, Mission Committee, Bishop Search Committee, and the Trustees. The report from the Albany Task Force on Communion Across Difference is included in this report.

The Wage and benefits committee gave a report and the Convention voted to go with their recommendation of a 3% increase in clergy stipend to start in 2024. I gave Richard the information so he can review it and make a recommendation to the Vestry.

The Convention voted to continue the Reduced Standard Assessment Formula in use by the Diocese for the past several years.

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The Convention voted to approve the 2024 Diocesan Operating budget of \$1,601,563.00. I have the breakdown and will post it on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall for anyone to look at. This includes monies for a new Bishop who is expected to be Ordained/ Consecrated in February of 2024.

Programs:

<u>Charlies Pantry:</u> Our members give nonperishable food items and household supplies as well as support the fuel fund. A food basket for donations is located in the back of the sanctuary. Eugenia delivers the food twice a month to Charlie's Pantry for distribution. This Pantry is open to the community in need on Saturdays.

Domestic Shelters: Members give personal hygiene products for the residents of the shelter to use. In addition, this month we are collecting blankets, sheets, and towels for the shelter to use.

<u>Animal Assistance</u>: We are partnering with a group of young people whom Bitsy has been teaching. We are helping with their service project collecting items that might be used in an animal shelter. Food, toys, blankets, soap, brushes, and combs to name a few. The students will give these items to the Pittsfield animal shelter.

Bates Fund Raiser: The Bruce Bates family home was destroyed by fire on February 11th. We thank God that no one was hurt, but everything is gone. The Bates have been members of our parish and they and their children and grandchildren were active members. Right now, until further information can be obtained, a financial collection is being made. You may drop off a financial contribution at Mavericks in New Lebanon, send a check to the town clerk or donate on the Go-Fund-Me page set up by their son on Facebook. The Town will be opening the free store and the Columbia County Burned-out Victims Fund will be available, if needed.

Building Fund: Money Needed for Sanctuary Repairs

From Father Frank Lockwood

I wish that Christianity never became a legal religion. Or at least wish that it had never become the "state religion". Why? Simple, once it became legal it lost its meaning, lost its power and very quickly became corrupted by politics and power. Those who followed "the Way" as it was sometimes called (I believe it was short for "the way of the Nazarene" referencing Jesus {Y'shua} being from Nazareth) were the fringe of society. They were forced to do things in secret. There was a steep price to pay if you got caught practicing this fringe cult's beliefs. To be a believer meant having to literally die to self because you would lose everything if caught.

Today, the Faith has been so watered down, scarred and polluted that I do not believe it would recognizable to a first, second or even third century believer. The moment that it became a culture—following it becoming the official state religion of the Holy Roman Empire, it started to become integrated with the culture. This integration was the opposite of what was preached by Jesus and later affirmed in the council of Jerusalem (see Acts Chapter 15). Jesus pushed against the "traditions of men" being taught. He focused on the matters of the heart and what that was supposed to look like for the believer. James will address this at the council when he says that they should not require the gentiles (non-Jewish followers of Jesus) to follow the Law (Kosher living) since it was impossible for them (James and the other Jewish believers) or their forefathers to successfully do so. This was an intentional de-culturalization of the faith.

Yet, to this day, many churches attempt to re-culturalize it. There is often what appears to me to be a demand for conformity within the Church. Even going so far as to push for laws that will cause non-believers to conform to our Faith. It did not work for Israel, what makes us think that we are so special that it will work for us? I know I don't expect it to. I expect it to cause the opposite reaction. Just as the early believer "rebelled" against the establishment (Pharisees and company) so too I expect that there will and already has been a strong rebellion against the forced Christian/Church culture.

We judge individuals who look different than us. We judge them for the clothing they wear, the way they speak, the music they listen to, the foods they eat and every other aspect we can. If it does not conform to our expectation of what it should look like, then we judge it as wrong. We then pour over the scripture to find a verse or two that will allow us to condemn it as not acceptable within the faith and thus attempt to repressurize the believer to greater and greater conformity. In so doing we create a greater and greater chasm between the us and God once again teaching as doctrine the precepts of men as if they are the will of God.

No wonder everyone rebels against the faith.

When God created us, what do you think he imagined? Drones moving to and fro taking care of the world around them? He created the ants and bees in order to watch that structure. He also created so much other diverse organisms. From solitary creatures to great herds and flocks. From humungous herbivores to tiny little blood drinking insects. In the midst of all of this diversity, he named none of it to be made in his image. Nope. Not at all. Until he made us. It is us that were created in his own image—including the gift of free will. I will be so bold to even go so far as to say that in his image he also gifted us with the gift of being able to create as well as we express in the arts and sciences. And you think that he did this so he could have a bunch of automatons walking around? That we all must not appear in any way different from each other?

One of the beauty of Pentecost was each hearing God's deeds in their own language. To those standing on the outside listening, it had to sound like a mosh pit of noise. Until the Spirit threaded through and knit it all together. That is the picture, I believe, of what God is looking for in his Church. The diversity of humankind

stitched together by the Spirit that to an unbeliever sounds like noise yet to God's ears he hears a choir of the highest heavens in perfect harmony echoing throughout time.

The older I get, the more convinced of this I become.


Prayer for Profile and Search Committee, written by Janet Papa:
